- ¹⁸ 'Come now, let us settle the matter,' says the LORD.
- 'Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool.
- ¹⁹ If you are willing and obedient, you will eat the good things of the land;
