²⁴ Instead of fragrance there will be a stench; instead of a sash, a rope; instead of well-dressed hair, baldness; instead of fine clothing, sackcloth; instead of beauty, branding.

- ²⁵ Your men will fall by the sword, your warriors in battle.
- ²⁶ The gates of Zion will lament and mourn; destitute, she will sit on the ground.

- Men: most are slain (3:25-4:1)

² In that day the Branch of the LORD will be beautiful and glorious, and the fruit of the land will be the pride and glory of the survivors in Israel.

³ Those who are left in Zion, who remain in Jerusalem, will be called holy, all who are recorded among the living in Jerusalem. ⁴ The Lord will wash away the filth of the women of Zion; he will cleanse the bloodstains from Jerusalem by a spirit^a of judgment and a spirit^b of fire.

⁵ Then the LORD will create over all of Mount Zion and over those who assemble there a cloud of smoke by day and a glow of flaming fire by night; over everything the glory^c will be a canopy. ⁶ It will be a shelter and shade from the heat of the day, and a refuge and hiding-place from the storm and rain.
